

## **Geoff Nicholson:**

Geoff Nicholson talks to Andrew Stuck about how he came to writing about "**The Lost Art of Walking**". The interview was recorded over the Internet in March 2010 and is published to coincide with the UK publication of the Lost Art of Walking (Harbour Books http://www.harbourbooks.co.uk/titles\_detail\_1.asp?ID=318).

Geoff was brought up in Sheffield and went for walks in the nearby Peak District. He moved to London and started writing – one of his first novels was called "Bleeding London" in which the leading character walks every street in London. Geoff now lives in Los Angeles, within easy walking distance of Hollywood and Sunset Boulevards, and is writing a witty blog about his walks in and around his neighbourhood – one of the least walked areas of the world: <a href="http://hollywoodwalker.blogspot.com/">http://hollywoodwalker.blogspot.com/</a> He is currently researching and writing a new book called "Walking in Ruins".
