Geoff Nicholson talks to Andrew Stuck about how he came to writing about "***The Lost Art of Walking***". The interview was recorded over the Internet in March 2010 and is published to coincide with the UK publication of the *Lost Art of Walking* (Harbour Books http://www.harbourbooks.co.uk/titles_detail_1.asp?ID=318).

Geoff was brought up in Sheffield and went for walks in the nearby Peak District. He moved to London and started writing – one of his first novels was called "*Bleeding London*" in which the leading character walks every street in London. Geoff now lives in Los Angeles, within easy walking distance of Hollywood and Sunset Boulevards, and is writing a witty blog about his walks in and around his neighbourhood – one of the least walked areas of the world: <http://hollywoodwalker.blogspot.com/> He is currently researching and writing a new book called "Walking in Ruins".
